



The Inclusive Economic and Social Recovery Project of Lake Chad or RESILAC aims to contribute to the economic recovery and the strengthening of the resilience and social cohesion of the Lake Chad Basin territories most affected by the Lake Chad crisis and climate change. The project aims to strengthen human capital, social cohesion and the collective and sustainable management of natural resources in the targeted territories, to promote economic recovery in the targeted territories and the resilience of the most vulnerable populations, especially young people and women through access to employment and intensified agri-silvo-pastoral production systems adapted to climate change, to enhance and consolidate the actors of the targeted territories by fostering dialogue and engagement, and building their capacities according to the skills and roles and produce useful knowledge for the quality of project activities in a crisis context and for decision-making by local actors. It is a consortium with ACF and Group URD for the Lac Chad Basin region and for a period of 4 years.



CARE's Response




90 000 direct participants and 1 600 000 indirect participants are expected to be reached by the end of the project
